

VISION Consistency Tool for Local Comprehensive Plans

Note: The tool shown here is for illustrative purposes. To fill out the tool, visit www.psrc.org/our-work/plan-review.

This tool is intended to help cities and counties integrate VISION 2050 into their local comprehensive plans. VISION 2050's multicounty planning policies serve as the adopted regional guidelines and principles required in state law to guide both regional and local planning. The tool also identifies transportation planning requirements of the Growth Management Act (GMA). The tool may be used at various times in the local planning process:

Plan Update Scoping: Use checklist items as guidance for scoping the extent of plan element updates. New or expanded issue areas in VISION 2050 are identified to support this process.

Draft Plan Review: Submit draft plans to PSRC prior to Planning Commission and Council review. Completing and submitting this tool and providing early drafts to PSRC help identify potential consistency issues early in the process.

Certification Review: Along with the adopted plan, the tool will assist in PSRC's review of the plan. Demonstrating inclusion of the necessary information in the checklist helps facilitate certification. Note: The PSRC Executive Board is the final decision-making body for plan certification.

Regional Collaboration: The tool provides cities and counties an opportunity to highlig supports sharing of best practices across the region and benefits jurisdictions as they







Key Policy Theme in VISION 2050








- Climate Goal: The region substantially reduces emissions of greenhouse gases that contribute to climate change in accordance with the goals of the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency (50% below 1990 levels by 2030 and 80% below 1990 levels by 2050) and prepares for climate change impacts.
 - Policies and actions address reducing emissions and the impacts from climate change, across many sectors
 - Discusses impacts from climate change and resilience needs and activities
 - Commits PSRC to regular analysis and evaluations as part of the 4-year Regional Transportation Plan cycle
 - Commits PSRC to develop a "climate wedge analysis" for full spectrum comparisons

Key Policy Theme in VISION 2050






Policies address a wide spectrum of climate related topics and sectors, such as:

- Preserving natural environments (urban tree canopy, forests, farmlands, wetlands, water supply, fisheries, etc.)
- Resilience of infrastructure and communities to climate impacts and natural disasters
- Regional coordination and cooperation
- Protection of vulnerable populations
- Reduction of emissions through:
 - alternative fuels and energy sources
 - green buildings and conservation
 - reduction of vehicle miles traveled

Key Policy Theme in VISION 2050



VISION 2050, Regional Transportation Plan -- emphasis on land use and transportation: PSRC, city / county key roles




PSRC's Four-Part Greenhouse Gas Strategy:

- Land Use: VISION 2050 regional growth strategy
- Choices: expanded and integrated regional transit network, active transportation and other multimodal investments
- User Fees: state facility tolls, transition to road usage charge in later years
- Technology: transition to zero emission vehicles, Clean Fuels Standard, etc.

VISION 2050's Regional Growth Strategy

- Growth strategy directly supports climate goal
- Leverages transportation options, encourages walkable centers, and protects farms and forests

 65% of region's population growth and 75% of employment growth targeted to regional growth centers & near high-capacity transit



Guidance Document - Overview



- Addresses both mitigation (emissions reduction) and resilience / preparedness
- Includes:
 - Summary of VISION 2050 climate related policies and actions
 - Best practices and examples
 - Resources and links
 - Range of opportunities
 - Guidance tailored to agency resources / level of effort / state of practice
 - Meeting jurisdictions where they are

Guidance Document - Overview



- Encourages internal coordination and leveraging existing resources, planning efforts and relationships / partnerships
 - For example conferring with Emergency Management departments, Public Works, etc.
- No expectation that every agency will address every issue, or create complex work programs
 - Focus on particular needs in each community / jurisdiction
 - Meaningful impacts can be accomplished at all scales



Example guidance – Mitigation:

- Opportunity to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from transportation includes, among other things —
 - Planning for and supporting new or expanded transit service and transitoriented development
 - Providing safe and connected bicycle and pedestrian facilities
 - Supporting and preparing for the transition to zero emission vehicles



Example guidance - Mitigation:

- Description of existing active transportation plans
- Link to PSRC's Transportation System Visualization Tool
 - Existing and planned bicycle and pedestrian facilities, in context with existing and planned transit stations / stops, demographic information, etc.
 - Helps to plan for gaps and needed connections
- Example of a local jurisdiction's bicycle / pedestrian planning work, prioritization of investments



Example guidance - Resilience:

- VISION 2050 policies call for addressing the impacts to vulnerable populations and areas that have been disproportionately affected by climate change
- Variety of suggested resources provided, to identify both vulnerable populations in communities as well as areas disproportionately impacted =
 - PSRC's demographic profile, Transportation System Visualization Tool, Displacement Risk Map, Regional Hazards Map
 - Washington Environmental Health Disparities Map
 - EPA; National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine; Municipal Research and Services Center examples



Example guidance - Resilience:

- Understanding the potential impacts facing your community and identifying your community's vulnerable and disproportionately impacted populations
- Examples provided from around the country of local jurisdictions planning for and mitigating these impacts:
 - Adopted policies, identification of goals and actions, development of plans
 - Various levels of effort for research, GIS analysis, evaluation and monitoring
 - Examples of actions and strategies; e.g., addressing extreme temperatures:
 - increase of public health / emergency response capacity; increased provision of open space and street trees; green roofs, cool pavement tools; public education on personal resilience
