Introductions and Announcements

Jesse Hamashima, Co-Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:30 am. Participants were asked to view the meeting attendance on the "chat" feature on Zoom, and phone-in participants were asked to identify themselves verbally.

Reports

Co-Chair Jesse Hamashima welcomed the committee members and explained that PSRC staff would provide short updates on upcoming policy and Executive Board meetings and review the status of ongoing projects in the work program.

Ben Bakkenta, Director of Regional Planning, shared that the Passport to 2044 comprehensive plan update support series has included nine events in partnership with Commerce and MRSC, over 1,000 attendees at the webinars, more than 650 more on the PSRC YouTube channel, and eighty percent of cities and counties in the region had staff attend at least one session. Looking forward in 2023, PSRC will hold a session on housing need & capacity with Commerce on February 15, with registration now open here. PSRC is also planning a session specific to elected officials and planning commissioners later this spring. Ben also reminded committee members and alternates to reconfirm their seat on the committee, and/or identify new representatives and alternates.

Discussion: Housing Public Opinion Poll

PSRC and the Washington State Department of Commerce hired consulting firm PRR to conduct a state-wide public opinion survey on housing. PSRC staff provided a briefing on survey results to the Regional Staff Committee.

SUBJECT: 2022 Housing Incentives and Tools Survey (HITS) Report

IN BRIEF

PSRC administered the 2022 Housing Incentives and Tools Survey (HITS) to local jurisdictions to better understand the use of tools and incentives to support the development of housing and affordable housing. Staff will provide a briefing on findings.

DISCUSSION

As an implementation step for the Regional Housing Strategy, PSRC fielded a survey in the summer of 2022 – the Housing Incentives and Tools Survey (HITS) – to local jurisdictions to better understand how these tools, incentives, and strategies are being used and which are having the biggest impact on increasing housing development and affordability. The 2022 HITS builds off a similar 2019 survey and captures new incentives, zoning and development codes and regulations, and success, challenges, and opportunities for local jurisdictions in implementing housing strategies. A total of 74 responses were collected – 87% of the cities, towns, and counties in the central Puget Sound. The 2022 HITS Report is slated to be published in early March, along with a supplemental data appendix.

Key Findings

Findings from the survey are organized under the Regional Housing Strategy's focus areas of Supply, Stability, and Subsidy. Findings include:

Supply

- More local jurisdictions are promoting housing affordability and access, but adoption of local zoning changes and incentives remains uneven.
- Local jurisdictions are expanding capacity and diversity of housing types, with a large increase in the number of jurisdictions considering new middle density zoning.
- Incentives and tools can have the greatest impact when calibrated to local conditions and used in combination with other tools.

• Housing access and affordability is a focus area for 2024 local comprehensive plan updates, including a focus on housing for larger households.

Stability

- The Multifamily Tax Exemption (MFTE) is a critical incentive for many cities.
- Housing Action Plan grant funding is linked to adoption of new housing tools and zoning regulations.
- Jurisdictions are beginning work to link larger goals for racial equity with housing access and affordability.

Subsidy

- Subsidies are needed to meet need for very affordable (0-50% AMI) housing.
- Jurisdictions are contributing to subregional partnerships to fund and implement local housing goals.

Next Steps

The 2022 Housing Incentives and Tools Survey report and supporting data appendix will be available in early March and will be shared with the Growth Management Policy Board at the March 2 meeting.

Staff plan to field the survey following the 2024 major period update to comprehensive plans as part of implementation monitoring.

SUBJECT: PSRC Plan Review Outreach

IN BRIEF

PSRC staff will brief the committee on current and planned outreach activities and support for the 2024 comprehensive plan updates. VISION 2050 calls for PSRC to support efforts to update local comprehensive plans through updates to plan review and certification guidance and building awareness on VISION 2050 (RC-Action-1 and RC-Action-4). Staff will provide an overview of upcoming outreach events and share what has taken place so far.

DISCUSSION

PSRC develops data, guidance, and resources to support implementation of VISION through local planning. PSRC has published numerous guidance documents to date, which are available on the <u>VISION 2050 Planning Resources</u> page. Following adoption of VISION 2050 in 2020, <u>PSRC has updated the Plan Review Manual</u> and issued guidance on growth target development, <u>economic development</u>, <u>climate change</u>, <u>coordination with Tribes</u>, <u>housing</u>, <u>equitable engagement</u>, and <u>transit-oriented</u> <u>development</u>.

Outreach to Date

At the beginning of 2022, PSRC staff distributed a survey to local jurisdictions to learn more about timelines and priorities for updating their comprehensive plans. This information was used to develop outreach opportunities in 2022.

To support staff in updating local comprehensive plans, PSRC staff have been working along with the Department of Commerce and MRSC on the <u>Passport to 2044</u> series of webinars. Nine events took place in 2022 covering available resources, best practices, and changes in state law since the last periodic update.

PSRC began a quarterly <u>Comprehensive Planning Newsletter</u> that includes highlights from PSRC and partners on new guidance documents and outreach opportunities.

Upcoming Outreach

In 2023 PSRC staff will continue the Passport to 2044 series and are looking for input on how it can best meet current needs of local staff. A session for elected officials is also being planned for May 2023, covering key issues in the region and a panel of elected officials.

In the first quarter of 2023, PSRC staff will be reaching out to all the 86 cities and counties in the region to share resources and information on the plan review process. This will be a great time to meet with PSRC staff to discuss current opportunities and challenges.

PSRC staff welcome any feedback from the Regional Staff Committee on information and tools needed for the comprehensive plan updates, as well as approach to engage with local staff.

Next Steps

Staff will provide more information to committee members and staff from local jurisdictions with specifics on upcoming events.

SUBJECT: GMA Projections, Growth Targets, and Land Use Forecast update

IN BRIEF

PSRC staff will brief the committee on the 2022 Office of Financial Management Growth Management Act projections and implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy through growth targets. Staff will also provide an update on release of an updated regional land use forecast product. PSRC staff welcome feedback from the Regional Staff Committee on data to support comprehensive plans or implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy.

DISCUSSION

At the end of 2022, the Office of Financial Management (OFM) released updated population projections to inform Growth Management Act planning. Given the local planning schedule, counties adopted growth targets in 2021-22 based on the Regional Macroeconomic Forecast and the 2017 OFM release of population projections. PSRC staff will provide an update on how the most recent OFM release aligns with the Regional Macroeconomic Forecast and the previous state projections.

Under the Growth Management Act, counties, in consultation with cities, are responsible for adopting 20-year growth targets. These growth targets are a key input to local comprehensive plans, ensuring that each county is accommodating population and employment growth. Jurisdictions use growth targets to inform land use, transportation, and capital facilities in their comprehensive plans. PSRC staff will provide an update on progress to adopt growth targets consistent with VISION 2050.

PSRC produces a land use forecasting product consistent with the Regional Growth Strategy and countywide growth targets. Following the adoption of VISION 2050 in 2020 and subsequent adoption of countywide growth targets in 2022, PSRC is producing an updated Land Use Vision forecast product. The Land Use Vision – Implemented Targets (LUV-it) forecast product is being developed to be consistent with these updated growth allocations and policies. The projections are also consistent with the goal established in the VISION 2050 Regional Growth Strategy to accommodate most

of the region's growth (65% of the population and 75% of the employment) in regional growth centers and near current and planned high-capacity transit service. PSRC staff will provide an update on release of the forecast product. The timing of the release supports the comprehensive plan updates due in 2024, as well as other studies that benefit from having a consistent representation of regional growth planning.

PSRC staff welcome feedback from the Regional Staff Committee on data to support comprehensive plans or implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy.

Next Steps

Staff will share release of the forecast product with the Regional Staff Committee and are available to provide assistance as needed.
