Board members welcomed the opportunity to identify housing tools that might best fit their communities with different needs. The board also talked about how to reach cities, letting them know about the typology and housing tools, and suggested there might a be "top five" tools.

2024 PSRC OFFICE RELOCATION

Budget Manager Andrew Werfelmann and Graphic Designer Tsukuru Anderson provided the board with an update on PSRC's new office space at 1201 Third Avenue. The new lease will commence January 1, 2024.

Subject: Greater Downtown Kirkland Regional Growth Center Application

IN BRIEF

PSRC and city staff will provide an overview of the City of Kirkland's application for regional growth center designation. The board will have the opportunity to ask questions and provide feedback to staff. No action on the center designation will be taken at this meeting.

DISCUSSION

In March 2018, PSRC adopted the Regional Centers Framework Update. This policy document clarifies the types of central places within the region; establishes criteria and planning expectations to ensure centers are continuing to be successful; provides for consistent designation for regional and countywide centers across the region; and addresses requirements for new centers and redesignation of existing regional centers. The Framework supports VISION 2050's objective of encouraging the development of compact, livable centers as an opportunity to accommodate a significant portion of the region's growth. The Framework defines two types of Regional Growth Centers (RGCs): Urban and Metro. Each growth center has specific designation criteria that require a minimum number of existing and planned activity unit densities (people and jobs), a mix of uses, transit access, and market potential.

Following the adoption of the Framework, the PSRC Executive Board adopted designation procedures for new centers in June 2018. The Framework established application deadlines, with the first application period for new regional centers ending on December 31, 2019. After this deadline, the application and review of new regional centers are limited to approximately every five years, following the results of the center's performance monitoring or during VISION updates.

Application Background

On December 30, 2019, PSRC received an application from the City of Kirkland for the designation of Greater Downtown Kirkland as an Urban Regional Growth Center. PSRC staff reviewed the application materials for consistency with the designation procedures criteria. At that time, the review found the application met much of the criteria, but some aspects were not yet complete, including the adoption of a subarea plan.

In an effort to work with the city and recognize the substantial work done so far to prepare the application, the Growth Management Policy Board acted to extend consideration of the application through June 2022 and subsequently provided a final extension to February 2023.

While COVID-19 disrupted the process, Kirkland and PSRC have closely coordinated since their initial application submittal in December 2019 to define an approach to completing the application requirements through planning efforts already included in the city's work program.

2023 Greater Downtown Kirkland Regional Center Designation Application

PSRC staff reviewed a draft application and expects to receive a final application by the February 2023 deadline from the City of Kirkland to designate a 564-acre center focused around Kirkland's historic downtown.




Figure 1: Greater Downtown Kirkland Area Boundaries

The city states the primary goal of the center is to continue to foster a walkable, compact, pedestrian, and transit-oriented area, relying on decades of community planning work within the Greater Downtown and especially the recently adopted NE 85th Street Station Area Plan and Moss Bay Neighborhood Plan. Additional goals for the center include; maximizing the use of the future Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) station to serve the Greater Downtown, promoting regional growth goals, and complementing the planned growth in the other Eastside regional growth centers.

The Greater Downtown Regional Growth Center primarily consists of the Moss Bay neighborhood and the NE 85th Street Station Area. Kirkland City Council adopted the revised Moss Bay Neighborhood Plan on December 14, 2021, and the NE 85th Street Subarea Plan June 28, 2022. These plans address a broad land use pattern, urban design and character, and future planning for the proposed regional center.

PSRC staff is reviewing the application and preparing a designation report in coordination with staff from the city. If PSRC designated the Greater Downtown Kirkland Regional Growth Center, it would be the second designated regional center in Kirkland (Totem Lake was designated as a center in 2003) and the 30th regional growth center in the central Puget Sound region.

NEXT STEPS

PSRC staff will seek board members' questions and comments on the designation application at the March 2 meeting. PSRC staff will brief the Regional Staff Committee at their March meeting as well. Board and committees will consider the feedback received, and PSRC staff will work with city staff to finalize the designation and plan certification reports. In future Growth Management Policy Board meetings, the board will be presented with the designation application and subarea plan, and the board will be asked to take action.

Subject: 2022 Housing Incentives and Tools Survey

IN BRIEF

PSRC administered the 2022 Housing Incentives and Tools Survey (HITS) to local jurisdictions to better understand the use of tools and incentives to support the development of housing and affordable housing. Staff will provide a briefing on findings from the survey.

DISCUSSION

As an implementation step for the Regional Housing Strategy, PSRC fielded a survey of local jurisdictions in the summer of 2022 – the Housing Incentives and Tools Survey (HITS). The survey's goal was to understand how housing tools, incentives, and strategies are being used and which are having the biggest impact on increasing housing development and affordability. The 2022 HITS builds off a similar 2019 survey and captures new incentives, zoning and development regulations, and success, challenges, and opportunities for local jurisdictions in implementing housing strategies. A total of 74 responses were collected, representing 87% of the cities, towns, and counties in the central Puget Sound.

The 2022 HITS Report is available on the PSRC website and a supplemental data appendix will be published in early March.

Key Findings

Findings from the survey are organized under the Regional Housing Strategy's focus areas of supply, stability, and subsidy. Findings include:

Supply

- More local jurisdictions are promoting housing affordability and access, but the adoption of local zoning changes and incentives remains uneven.
- Local jurisdictions are expanding the capacity and diversity of housing types, with a large increase in the number of jurisdictions considering new middledensity zoning.
- Incentives and tools can have the greatest impact when calibrated to local conditions and used with other tools.
- Housing access and affordability is a focus area for 2024 local comprehensive plan updates, including a focus on housing for larger households.

Stability

- The Multifamily Tax Exemption (MFTE) is a critical incentive for many cities.
- Housing Action Plan grant funding is linked to the adoption of new housing tools and zoning regulations.
- Jurisdictions are beginning work to link larger goals for racial equity with housing access and affordability.

Subsidy

- Subsidies are needed to meet the need for very affordable (0-50% AMI) housing.
- Jurisdictions are contributing to subregional partnerships to fund and implement local housing goals.

Staff will brief the board about the survey approach and findings; and welcome feedback on how best to share and use this information to support regional and local housing work.

NEXT STEPS

PSRC plan to share survey results with local governments and other housing stakeholders. Staff plan to field another survey following the 2024 major periodic update to comprehensive plans as part of implementation monitoring.

Subject: Growth Management Act Projections, Growth Targets, and Land Use

Forecast

IN BRIEF

PSRC staff will brief the board on the 2022 Office of Financial Management Growth Management Act projections and implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy through growth targets. Feedback and questions from the board are welcome regarding data to support comprehensive plans and implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy.

DISCUSSION

At the end of 2022, the Office of Financial Management (OFM) released updated population projections to inform Growth Management Act planning, as they do every five years. These projections are a key input to local comprehensive planning. Given the local planning schedule, counties adopted growth targets in 2021-22 based on PSRC's Regional Macroeconomic Forecast and the 2017 OFM population projections. PSRC staff will provide an update on how the most recent population projections align with PSRC's forecast, the previous state projections, and adopted growth targets.

Under the Growth Management Act, counties, in consultation with cities, are responsible for adopting 20-year growth targets. These growth targets are a key input to local comprehensive plans, ensuring that each county accommodates population and employment growth. Jurisdictions use growth targets to inform land use, transportation, and capital facilities in their comprehensive plans. PSRC staff will provide an update on the progress to adopt growth targets consistent with the Regional Growth Strategy in VISION 2050.

PSRC produces a land use forecasting product to inform local comprehensive planning and other studies that consider regional growth. Following the adoption of VISION 2050 and the subsequent adoption of countywide growth targets, PSRC is producing an updated Land Use Vision forecast product. PSRC staff will provide an update on the release of the forecast product. The timing of the release supports the comprehensive plan updates due in 2024, as well as other studies that benefit from having a consistent representation of regional growth planning.

PSRC staff welcome questions or feedback from the board on data to support comprehensive plans or forward implementation of the Regional Growth Strategy.

Subject: Public Participation Plan Update

IN BRIEF

PSRC supports broad and active participation in the agency's work. Staff have been working with the Equity Advisory Committee to update the agency's Public Participation Plan. A draft version is being reviewed by PSRC boards this month with the goal of releasing the plan for public comment from March 23 to May 8, 2023.

DISCUSSION

The Puget Sound Regional Council is committed to transparency and participation by the diversity of interests throughout the region. Through the active participation of the people of the region, the quality of plans and policies are better tuned to meet the needs of the region's people into the future.

The Puget Sound Regional Council maintains a Public Participation Plan to establish consistent procedures to ensure people have reasonable opportunities to be involve themselves in the regional planning process. The plan provides examples of the tools and techniques the agency may use to communicate with the public. Public Participation Plans are a federal requirement for Metropolitan Planning Organizations. PSRC last updated its Public Participation Plan in 2018.

The new draft Public Participation Plan has an enhanced focus on equitable engagement, updated goals, desired outcomes and guiding principles, and a suite of new techniques and tools for engagement. The new plan also features an expanded emphasis on public participation related to the VISION 2050 and the Regional Housing Strategy.

Subject: Regional Transit-Oriented Development Committee Work Plan

IN BRIEF

The Regional Transit-Oriented Development Committee (RTODC), an advisory committee to the Growth Management Policy Board, advances a broad, multi-stakeholder coalition to support equitable transit-oriented development and the region's adopted growth strategy. The committee will begin implementing its 2023 work plan at its first meeting of the year on March 17, 2023.

DISCUSSION

2022 Work Plan

The committee held four quarterly meetings and hosted three events in 2022. Key efforts are listed below.

Provide direction on regional planning work:

- Transit-oriented development (TOD) in comprehensive plans guidance
- Criteria for transportation projects supporting growth in centers and transit station areas

Learn from others about promising practices:

- Presentations from guest speakers, including Sound Communities and Open Doors for Multicultural Families
- Standing "Lessons Learned" agenda item

Convene TOD stakeholders for information sharing and networking:

- Spring hybrid webinar focused on Tax Increment Financing and other incentives
- Summer walking tour of the University District
- Fall full-day hybrid event focused on TOD for all
- Quarterly Talkin' TOD newsletter

2023 Work Plan

The committee discussed the 2023 work plan at its December 2022 meeting. The discussion focused on how to "put the committee to work" to support state, regional, and local efforts such as implementing VISION 2050 and the major periodic update to comprehensive plans. Key topics for the 2023 work plan include:

Help Develop Regional Guidance and Resources

- Regional Growth Strategy guidance Provide input on guidance to help implement VISION 2050's goal of 65% of the new population and 75% of new employment growth near high-capacity transit.
- Connecting people to transit Provide support and input on PSRC
 Transportation Policy Board's access to transit work. Exact topic(s) to be
 determined.
- Regional Centers monitoring Help to identify metrics and data sources for the 2025 Regional Centers monitoring report.
- Best practices for TOD adjacent to industrial areas Help to develop best practices and resources for planning for TOD near industrial areas.

Information Sharing and Peer Networking

 Rotate between committee round robin updates and Promising Practices – guest speaker series to hear about TOD work across and outside the region.

Convening

- Early winter/late spring walking tour for committee members only due to space constraints
- A full-day hybrid event in fall 2023 open to the public

from member jurisdictions, tribes, and representatives of statutory members. Each elected representative is a voting member of the General Assembly.
