## 2018 Regional Centers Framework

#### The framework....

- Establishes criteria and planning expectations for regional centers
- Ensures consistency for designation of centers
- Addresses requirements of new centers and redesignation of existing centers
- 2024/2025 Designate new centers and redesignate existing centers

## Today's Regional Centers

#### 30 RGCs and 10 MICs

- 50,000 acres and 8% of the region's urban area
- 300,000 people and 7% of the region's population
- 930,000 jobs and 44% of the region's employment

# Types of Regional Centers

#### **Regional Growth Centers**

#### Metro Growth Center

- Dense existing jobs and housing
- Major transit hubs
- Provide regional services

#### **Urban Growth Center**

- High-quality transit service
- New opportunities for growth

#### Manufacturing Industrial Centers

#### **Industrial Employment Center**

- Highly active industrial areas
- Significant existing jobs
- Preserve jobs and land use


#### **Industrial Growth Center**

- Cluster of industrial lands
- Potential for future job growth
- Long-term growth and retention

## Regional Growth Allocations and Local Planning

#### Regional Growth Strategy & Local Comprehensive Plans

- VISION 2050 calls for regional growth to be focused in designated centers and near transit stations
- Cities with regional growth centers are designated to be the most intensely urban place in the region
- Jurisdictions are to encourage growth in regional growth centers and high-capacity transit areas











## Regional Transportation Funding

#### **PSRC's Federal Transportation Funding**

- Supports the development of centers and transportation corridors that serve them
- Projects are evaluated for their support for centers and compact urban development, among other factors
- Total PSRC funding ~\$290 million annually from Federal Highway
   Administration and Federal Transit Administration




#### Description:

The Downtown Tacoma regional growth center includes a wide variety of commercial, industrial, residential, institutional and civic uses. Downtown Tacoma includes several city, county, and state government offices, as well as hospitals, schools, retail, restaurants, and cultural opportunities. Downtown Tacoma includes a large number of small blocks, creating a fine-grained street network that is easily accessible to pedestrians as well as by public transit and car. The center is served by Tacoma Link, Amtrak, Sounder, and bus and borders I-5 to the south.

## What We've Heard - Regional System of Centers

## Incorporating into Scope

- Evaluate centers by type and transit availability
- Data to Include: housing affordability, walkability, urban form consideration, transit service to neighboring centers, displacement, public health

## **Evaluating Feasibility**

Commute patterns for workers in centers

#### Included in Other PSRC Work or Outside of Scope

- Industrial jobs categorization and data collection
- Worker job locations and data set updates
- Transportation impacts to passthrough communities near centers



## What We've Heard - Individual Centers

#### Incorporating into Scope

- Examine trend lines and reasonable measures being made
- Identification of critical infrastructure and cultural institutions

## **Evaluating Feasibility**

- Availability of public land
- Public investments made by local jurisdictions

#### Included in Other PSRC Work or Outside of Scope

 Individual centers for redesignation outside of current framework requirements: tenure, demographic information





## 2025 Monitoring & Redesignation Process

#### **Purpose**

Evaluate how the region's system of centers is meeting objectives and determine if updates may be needed to the framework to achieve this.

Evaluate individual regional centers to determine how they meet criteria, the work being done, and redesignate as appropriate.

#### **Key Questions**

How has the regional system of centers performed in achieving outcomes?

What level of planning has been done for centers and what's their potential?

How are individual centers meeting criteria?

## Proposed Data Collection – System Performance

How has the regional system of centers performed in achieving outcomes?

**Demographics:** Who lives in centers, tenure

**Housing characteristics:** Housing types, affordability

**Employment characteristics**: Who works in centers, how do incomes compare to the region, what jobs are available

**Mobility:** Existing mode split, transportation infrastructure

**Urban form:** Land use, block size

Environment & Public Health: Open space, emissions reduction, safety, walkability

What level of planning has been done for centers and what's their potential?

Subarea Plans and consistency with VISION 2050

**Growth Targets** for employment and households

**Zoned Capacity** 

**Market Demand** 

Transportation Infrastructure: Planned projects and amenities

## **Data Collection - Individual Centers**

How are individual centers meeting criteria?

**Existing conditions:** Density, employment numbers, mix of uses, transit or TDM availability

**Planning:** Target density, subarea plan certification, market potential, housing need and risk of displacement

Local Commitment: Local investments and priority
