









- Invests in getting people to, from, and around East King County
- Serves three regional growth centers and improves access for all
- Currently served by portions of Metro Routes 239, 250, 255, and 271
- Expected ~\$68 million investment





#### Speed and Reliability Benefits

- Corridor-wide travel time savings
  - 10 to 20 minutes per trip (14-26% savings in the PM peak)
- Increased ridership
  - 2,500+ new daily riders
- Increasing mobility within the Kirkland and Bellevue regional growth centers
- Increased connections at 5 regional transit centers (Totem Lake, Kirkland, South Kirkland, Bellevue, and Eastgate)
  - Major regional transit connections: ST Link 2 Line, RapidRide
     B Line, and the future ST I-405 BRT
  - Improved connections to Bellevue College and Lake Washington Institute of Technology




#### Speed and Reliability Investments

- Queue Jumps





#### **CMAQ Funding Goal**

**K** Line
