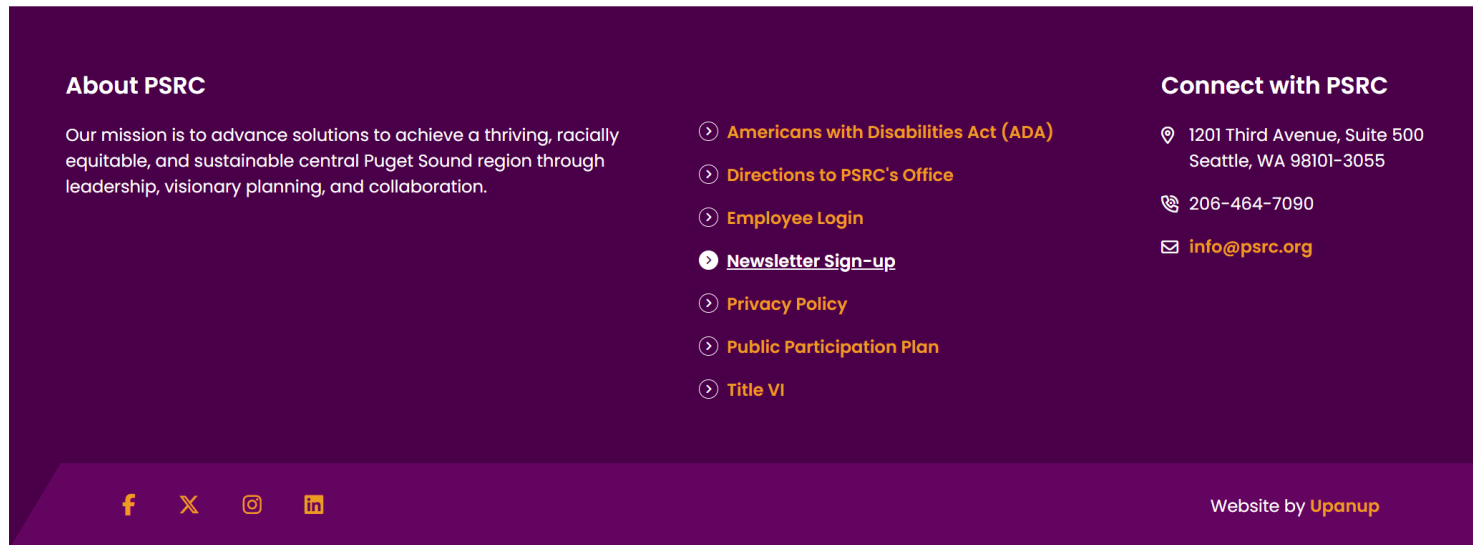

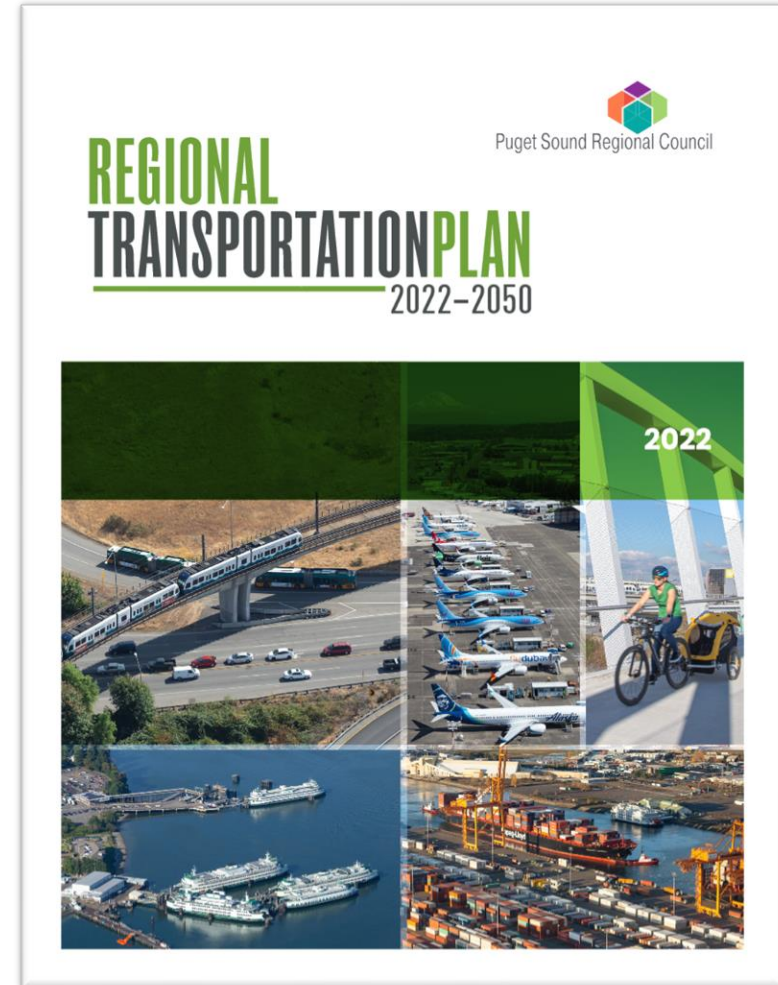


Regional Transportation Plan (2026 – 2050): Overview & TDM Existing Conditions



Regional TDM Inventory: Overview

- Built upon 2019–2020 inventory
- Goals
 - Quantify investments and outcomes
 - Simplify language and number of strategies
 - Minimize follow-up
- Distributed in October 2023
- Challenges with response rate
 - 61 responses

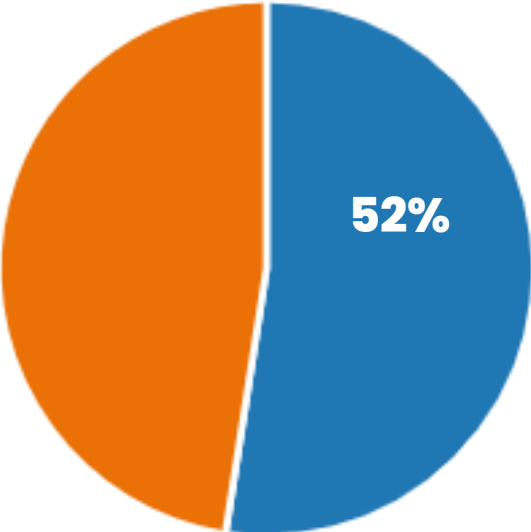

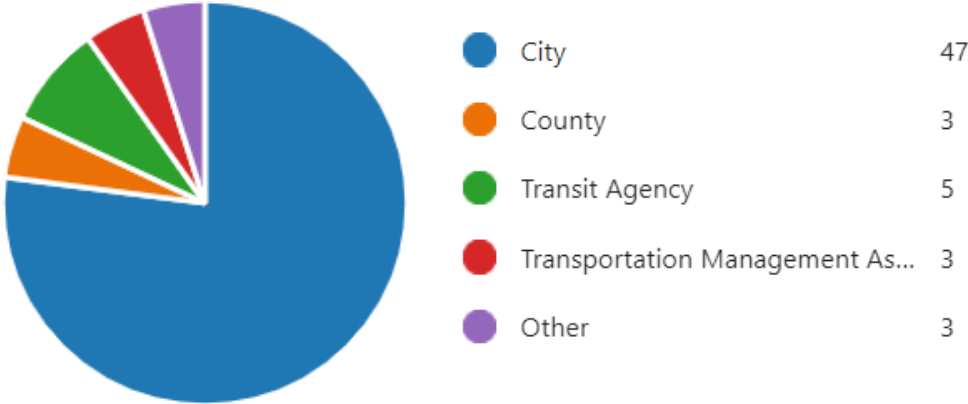
Regional TDM Inventory: Respondents

Of the **61** respondents, only **32** (52%) indicated they implement TDM.

61 respondents, by organization type:

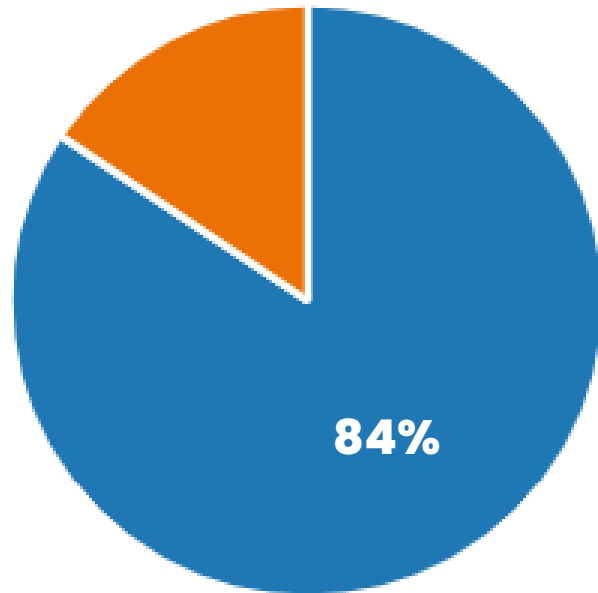

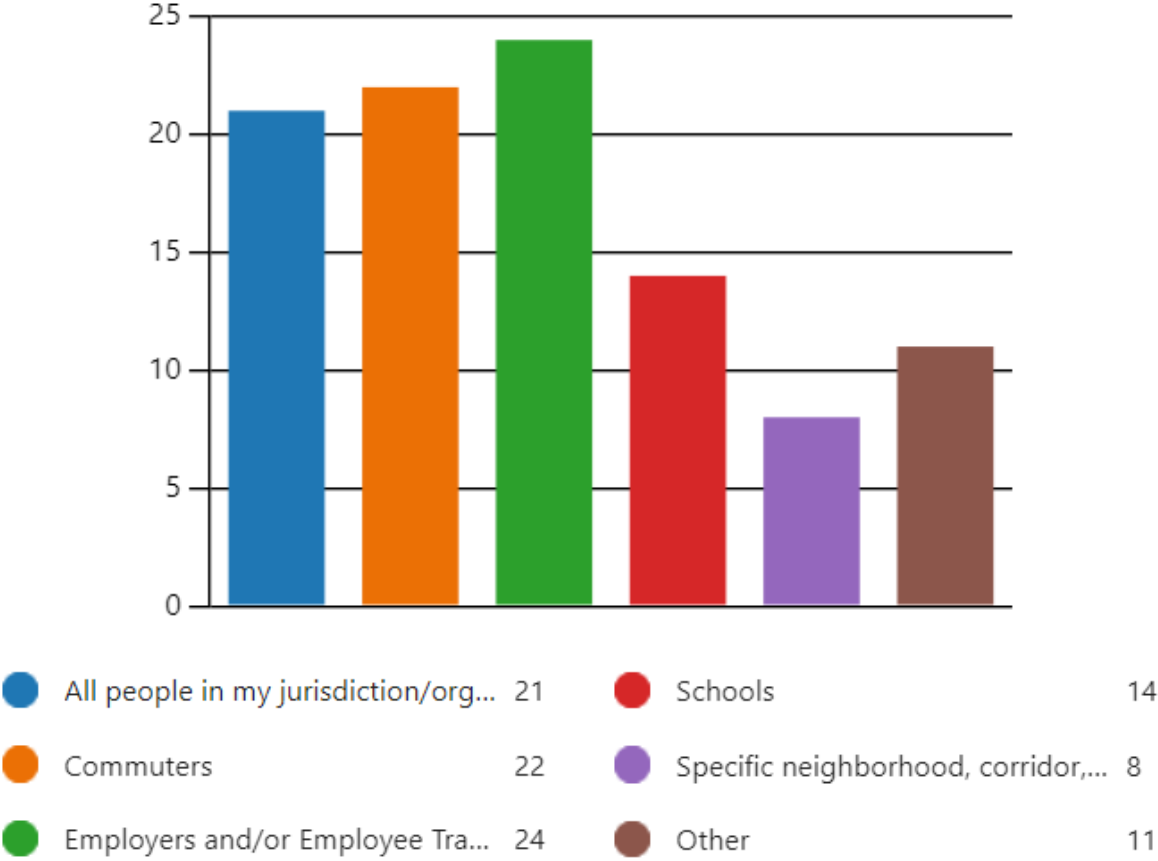


Of the **32** respondents who indicated they implemented TDM, **27** engage in contracting with partner organization(s).

“General audience” TDM programs are not far behind commute and employment-focused programs.

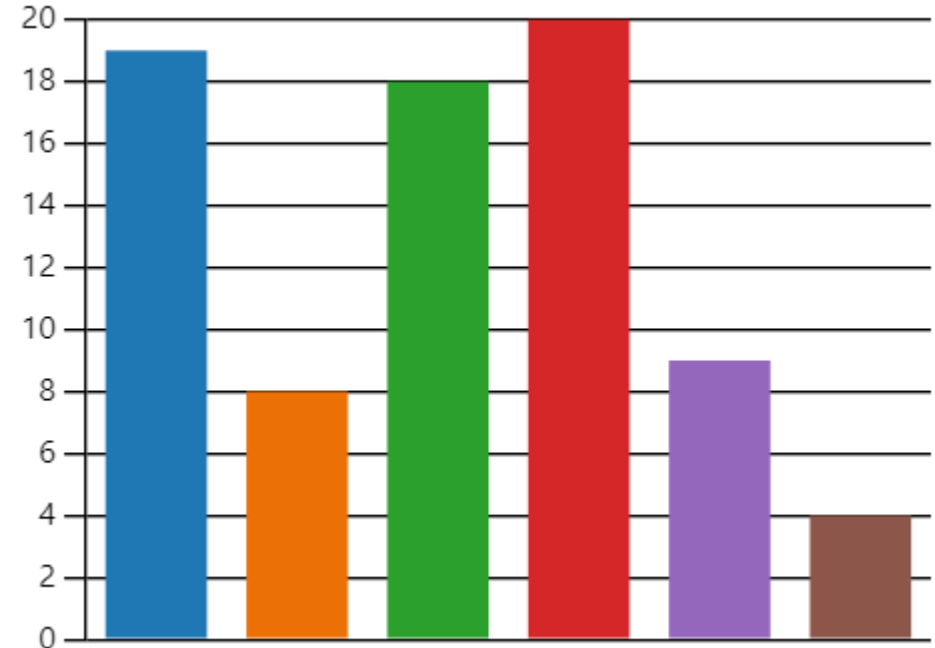
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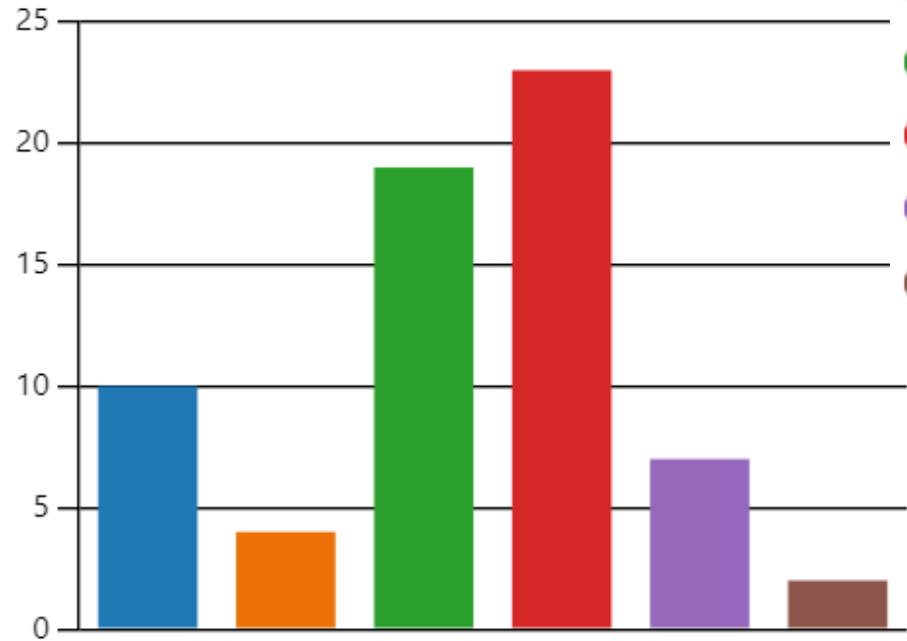

Resources for Plan Consistency

Commuter Trip Reduction Plans – Local CTR Plans

Jurisdictions affected by the Commuter Trip Reduction (CTR) Law are required to develop a local commuter trip reduction plan and update it at least once every four years.

These plans are designed to ensure that CTR program goals and targets help jurisdictions achieve their broader transportation and land use goals, and that the jurisdiction in turn develops services, regulations, policies, and programs that support the trip reduction investments of major employers.

In October 2023 the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) published [guidance](#) for the next cycle of four-year plans, covering July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2029.

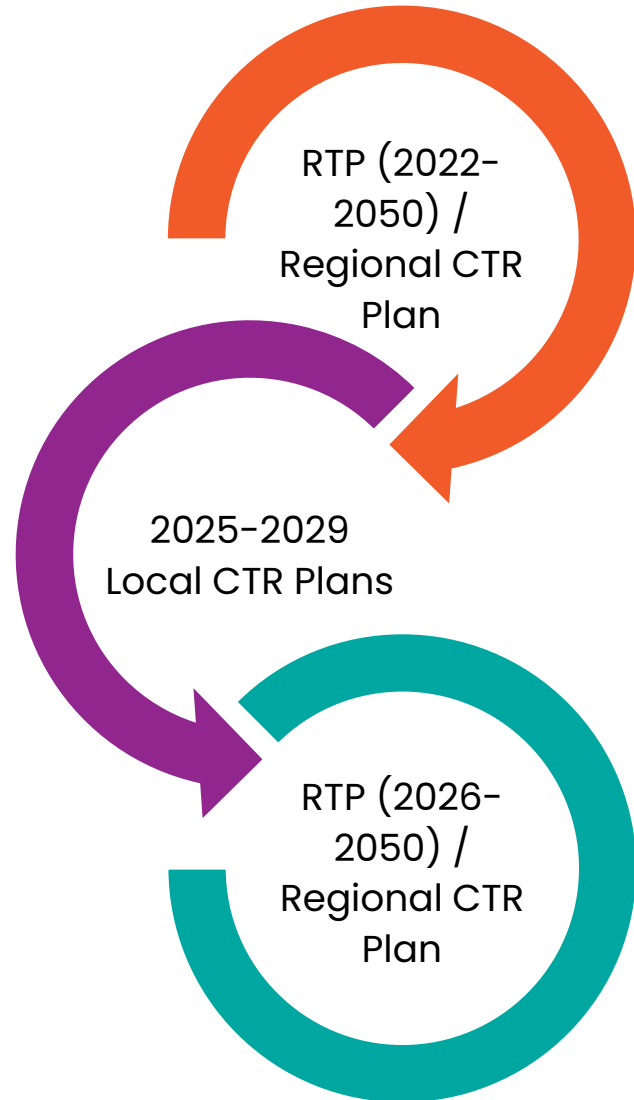
