2024 Housing Monitoring Update: The State of the Region's Housing

The <u>2024 Housing Monitoring Report</u> was presented to the board, which includes data and analysis on the region's housing supply, affordability and production.

The 2024 update shows that residents still struggle to access housing within their housing budget, as most renters are cost burdened. Housing production has increased, with 5,000 units of income-restricted housing developed, but to meet the region's goals, 15,000 units will be needed annually. With comprehensive plan updates, local jurisdictions are planning for housing at all income levels, allowing for different types of middle housing and addressing barriers to housing development.

PSRC's Regional Housing Strategy stems from VISION 2050's plan of meeting the housing and affordability needs of residents in the region. PSRC will continue to track and monitor the region's housing landscape. <u>View video</u> and <u>presentation</u>.

Regional Safety Action Plan Development

The board was briefed on the development of PSRC's Regional Safety Action Plan. PSRC was awarded two planning grants through USDOT's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program and started to develop the Regional Safety Action Plan. Throughout the summer and fall, PSRC staff and consultants conducted public outreach, tabling at events, facilitating four regional public meetings and the opening of the RSAP Engagement Hub, which provided information to the public on how they can participate in the development of the plan. The board was presented with key data findings and a preliminary menu of tools and strategies developed for the next steps. The plan is scheduled to be adopted in the spring of 2025. Regional Transportation Plan (2026-2050) Scope of Work

The Transportation Policy Board reviewed the key elements identified in the draft scope of work for the next Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) to be adopted in May 2026. The draft scope of work is based on VISION 2050 and the policy priorities determined by the board earlier in the year. Revisiting Project Selection Policy Issues

The board reviewed data compiled to support discussion of two topics identified earlier in the year for further exploration: (1) setting a potential scoring threshold below which projects would not be eligible for funding and (2) potentially restricting eligibility of projects that increase general purpose vehicle lane capacity on limited access facilities. A summary of the Regional Project Evaluation Committee deliberation and recommendations on both topics was also reviewed. Based on this information, the board determined that no further action is needed at this time. In future project selection processes, PSRC staff will continue to share details on the outcomes and

scope elements of every project, including those adding general purpose lane capacity. <u>View presentation</u>.



community to weigh in on the design






Addressing Displacement

 High scoring projects included sponsor agencies that demonstrated a strong commitment to countering displacement risk, e.g., an agency with a Housing Action Plan 101 projects were awarded \$239 million in Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funds, with outcomes that include:

- Building sidewalks or pathways
- Upgrading intersections
- Installing bike lanes
- Improving the transit network
- Stormwater improvements
- Preserving & maintaining existing transportation facilities







Projects throughout the region are making it easier to get around by any mode, such as this intersection improvement.

35 projects were awarded \$473 million in Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds.

This includes 7 projects receiving Equity Formula funds, directing investments to Equity Focus Areas.

Transit project outcomes include:

- Accessibility improvements to ferry facilities
- Bus stop rehabilitation
- Vehicle purchases, including zero-emission buses
- High-capacity transit network expansion (e.g., Link, Bus RapidRide)
- Passenger amenities
- Fast Ferry docking facility
- Transit infrastructure (e.g., trolley poles, switches)
- Vehicle and transit facility maintenance

Subject: Title VI Demographic Profile

IN BRIEF

At its meeting on December 5, 2024, the Equity Advisory Committee (EAC) will participate in a series of conversations regarding PSRC's Title VI demographic profile and associated work program. Committee members will be asked to provide feedback on analyses completed to date as well as comment on the ongoing and future work PSRC is undertaking with the EAC subcommittee formed to collaborate with staff on the demographic profile.

DISCUSSION

As part of its Title VI requirements, PSRC develops and maintains a <u>Title VI Plan</u> which includes a demographic profile of the central Puget Sound region's people of color, low-income, and other populations relevant to supporting the agency's Title VI and regional equity work programs, including public outreach and engagement activities. The profile is updated every three years, with the most recent update completed in October 2024.

The Committee was first introduced to the Title VI demographic profile at its meeting in March 2024. In June, the Committee received a project update, learned about revised race and ethnicity reporting standards being used for the 2024 profile, and also heard about work items that the EAC demographic profile subcommittee would be partnering with PSRC staff to co-create.

The discussion agenda for the Committee's December meeting will cover the following items:

• <u>2024 Demographic Profile:</u> An overview of data highlights from the <u>2024 Central Puget Sound Demographic Profile</u>

- <u>Next Steps:</u> The current and future scope of work related to the demographic profile that PSRC staff and the EAC demographic profile subcommittee will be collaborating on, including:
 - Creation of an interactive online StoryMap report to make key information from the 2024 profile more accessible to the general public
 - Consideration of alternative data tabulation methods to better highlight existing racial inequities
 - Exploration of additional equity lenses that may be incorporated into future versions of the profile

During the December session, Committee members will be asked if they have questions or feedback regarding the demographic profile, including:

- Its content and key takeaways
- Its relationship to downstream equity efforts at PSRC
- The scope of the forthcoming interactive StoryMap report
- Potential ways to strengthen the existing profile
- Any other aspect of the presentation materials

NEXT STEPS

Staff will return to the Equity Advisory Committee at its meeting in June 2025 to present a project update and solicit feedback on a draft interactive StoryMap report.
