# Discussion: Follow-Up on Regional Capacity Project thresholds for pedestrian and bicycle facilities

Kelly McGourty, PSRC, shared the feedback PSRC received on Regional Capacity Project (RCP) thresholds for pedestrian and bicycle facilities from BPAC members since the last meeting and discussed how PSRC may address those. She sought committee feedback on the approaches. Based upon feedback from the committee, she indicated that she would follow-up with individual committee members who indicated that they could provide further detail on their feedback. As described in past meetings, BPAC feedback will be considered in update of these specific thresholds in preparation for a March RCP call for projects.

# Regional Transportation Plan Regional Capacity Project Thresholds for Bicycle / Pedestrian Facilities

### February 2025

This topic was discussed at BPAC in November 2024 and January 2025, with any additional feedback requested via email.

Based on the discussions, a modest revision will be applied to the existing threshold. Please note that PSRC is currently working with a consultant to update the RTP Plan Consistency Framework and conduct research into processes utilized by other MPOs around the country. While not anticipated, if any further revisions are indicated upon completion of this research, that information will be shared with BPAC prior to the call for projects in March.

# <u>Current Threshold</u> = Projects over \$20 Million on separated pathways on dedicated rights of way

Feedback received fell under two categories – consider increasing the total cost threshold, and consider clarifying appropriate surface type.

In regards to cost, PSRC reviewed all relevant projects in the RTP and TIP, and determined the median cost for these regionally significant investment types to be \$25 million.

In regards to surface type, there was not concurrence to specifically identify paved surfaces only for the threshold. As such, the stated threshold will not be revised in this manner. However, the intent is to identify regionally significant transportation facilities, rather than recreational only, and national guidance exists regarding suitable surface types under various situations. PSRC will review each project submitted to the RTP on a case by case basis to ensure applicability.
