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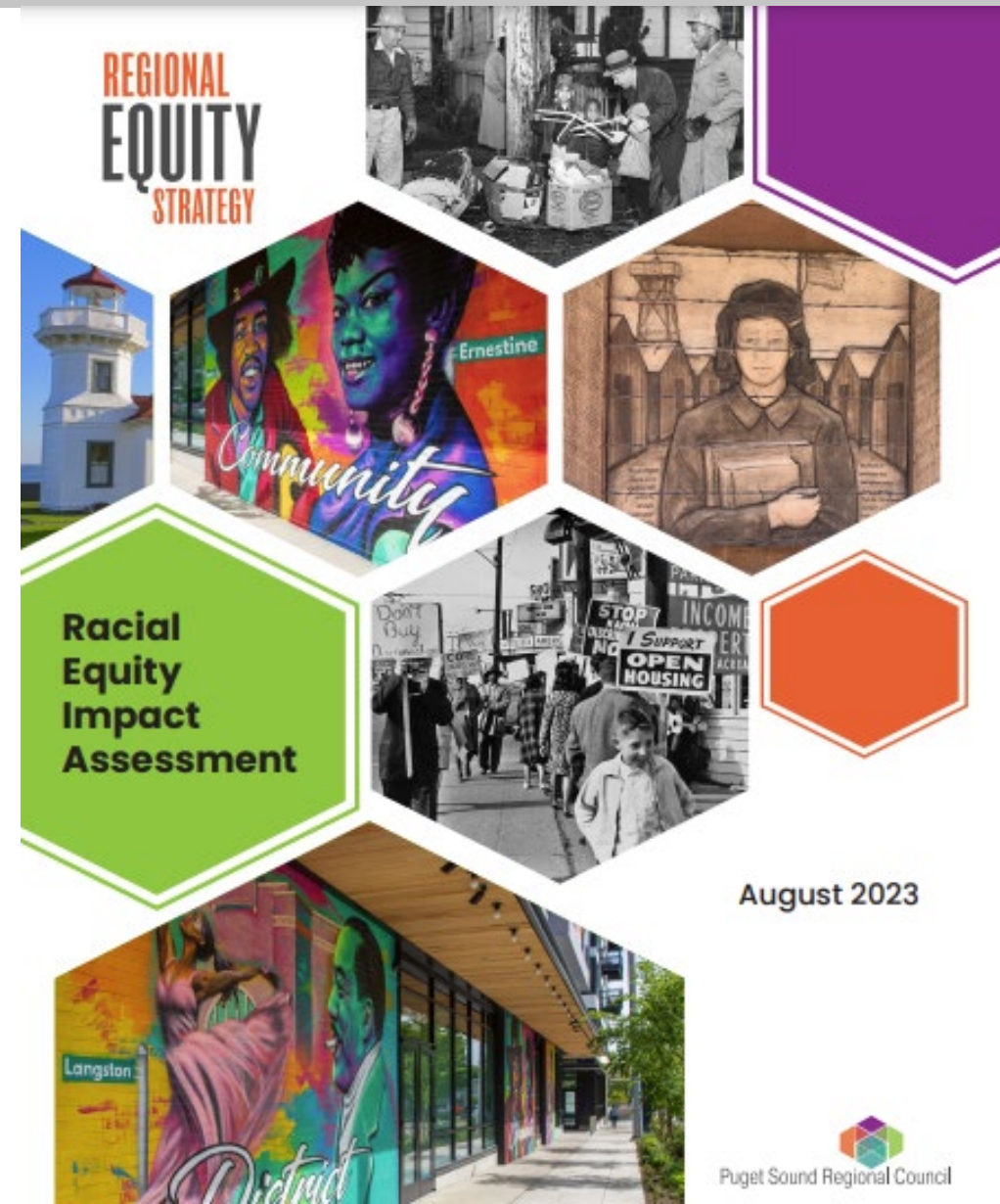


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Overview of Racial Equity Impact Assessment (REIA)

- Racial equity assessments are designed to **integrate explicit consideration of racial equity in decisions, including policies, practices, programs, and budgets.**
- Use of a racial equity tool can help to develop strategies and actions that **reduce racial inequities and improve success for all groups.**

What is a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)?

Responds to planned growth to 2050

- VISION 2050 transit-focused regional growth strategy

Objectives:

- Plan for future investments to accommodate planned growth in population, employment, travel
- Make progress on existing challenges
- Address current and future needs of the transportation system

Board feedback to date on policy priorities for the next plan have confirmed the commitment to:

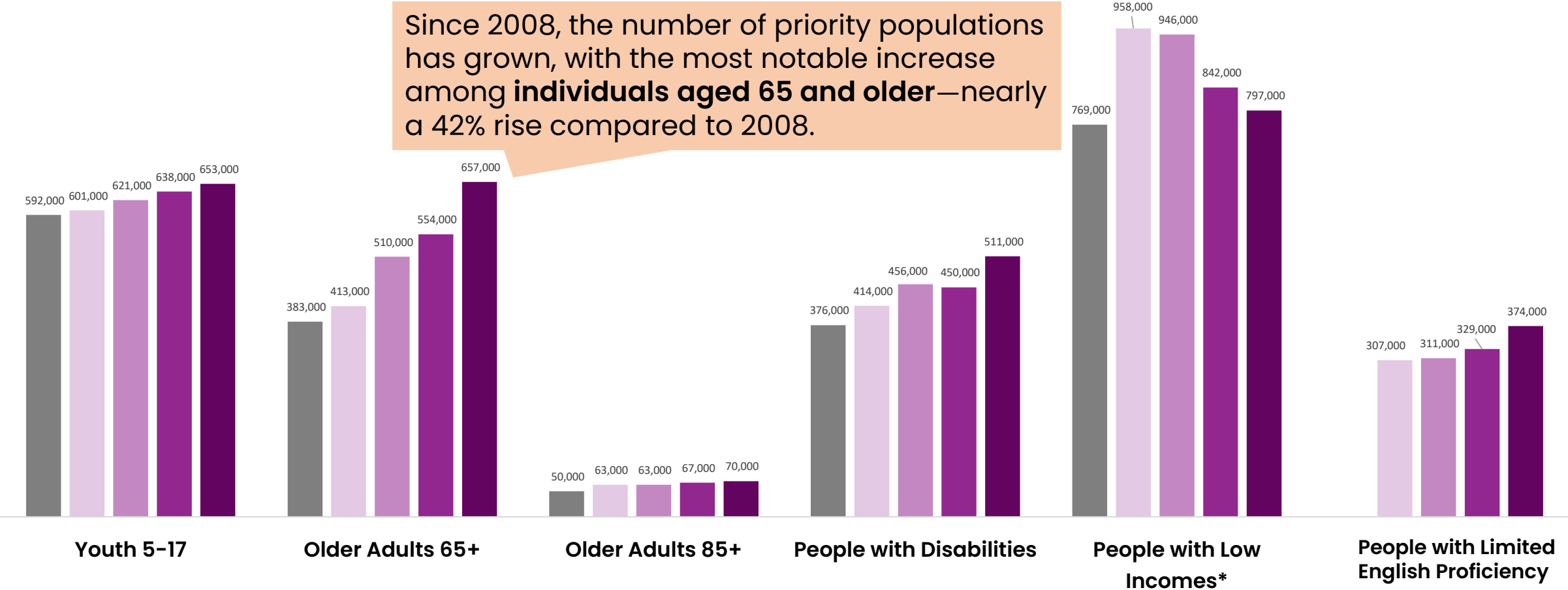


Priority populations in our region are growing

Coordinated Mobility Plan's Priority Populations Changes, 2008–2023

■ 2008 ■ 2011 ■ 2015 ■ 2019 ■ 2023

Since 2008, the number of priority populations has grown, with the most notable increase among **individuals aged 65 and older**—nearly a 42% rise compared to 2008.



*People with Low Incomes defined as people with incomes at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level



What's included in the Coordinated Mobility Plan?

- Information on **population trends**.
- **Transportation needs** of the people with accessibility and mobility challenges, due to their age, income, or ability.
- **Prioritized strategies** addressing the needs.
- A **regional inventory** of existing transportation programs.

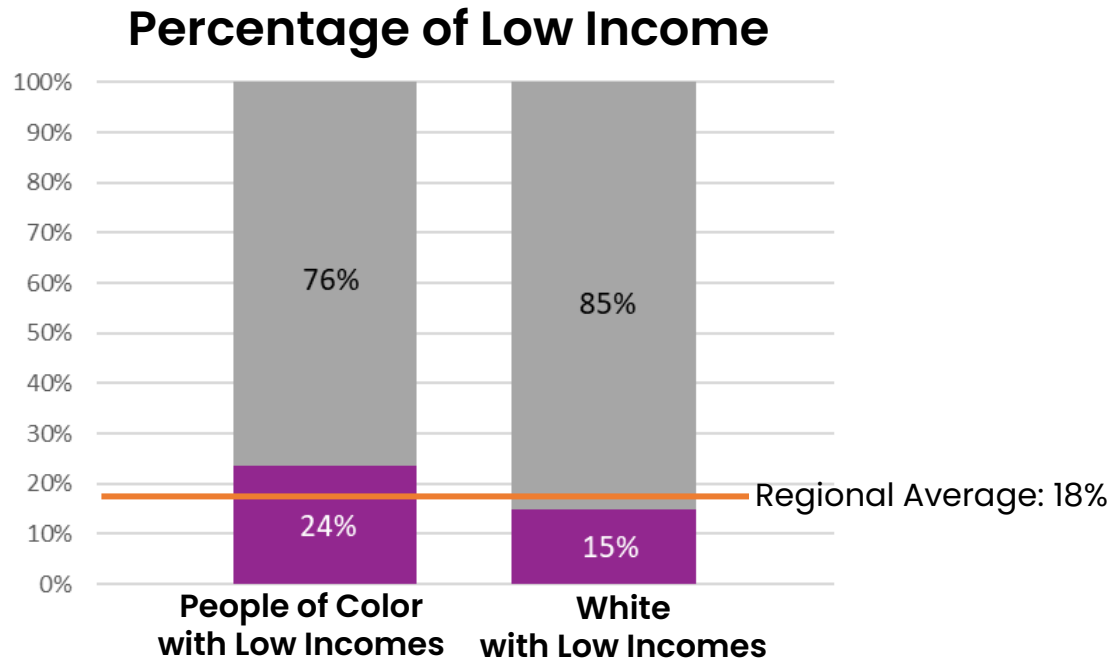


The plan addresses equity and inclusion by:

- Incorporating people of color in conjunction with age, income, and ability.
- Highlighting the **mobility needs of the historically marginalized and underserved communities**, identified through engagement.



A Larger percentage of people of color have low incomes.



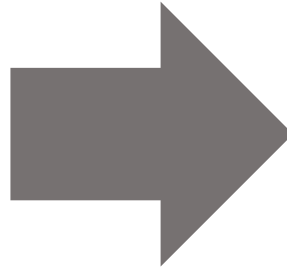
- **Low-income rates are even higher** (above 30%) for some of the race/ethnicity groups.
- 23% of women of color have low incomes.

Key Mobility Needs

Highlights To Date:

- Lack of services at times when needed
- Difficulty in cross-county travel
- Long travel and transfer times
- Limited or no services in areas outside of transit district boundaries, especially in rural areas
- Difficulty getting to/from medical appointments, pharmacies, and grocery stores
- Lack of ADA-accessible infrastructure

PSRC engaged three county mobility coalitions so far.

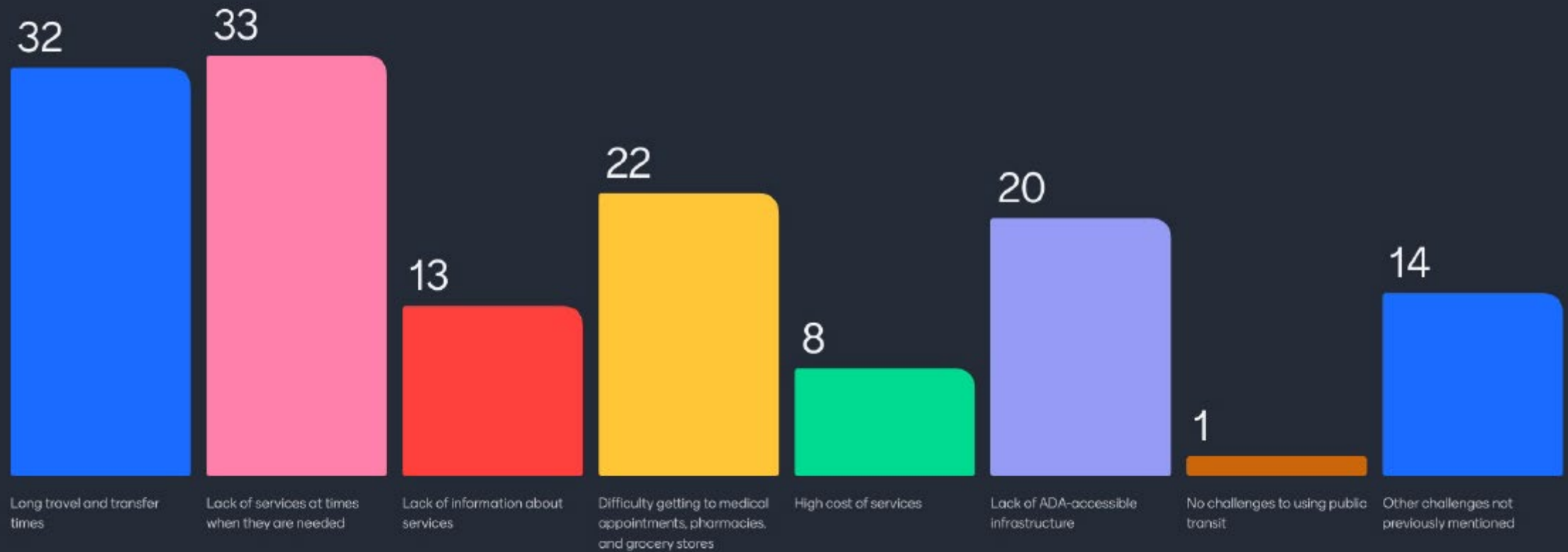

Current roads/infrastructure acting as a barrier for public transit. Ex: roads not wide enough, on street parking preventing buses on the road, etc.

Long waiting times in bad weather

Not enough braille signage provided at decision points.

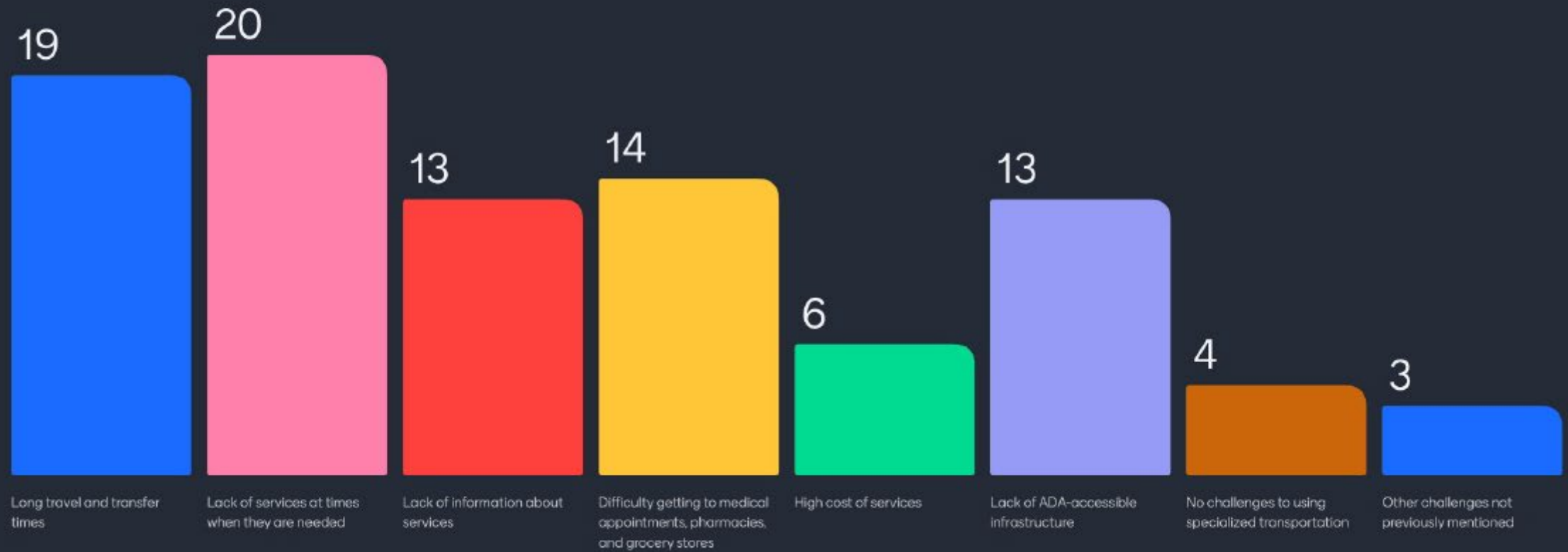
safety for drivers and riders

Need for continuity of solution and opportunities.

I hear complaints about transfers. Also need more coordination between Homage TAP and CT DART & Metro ACCESS is needed.

I see DART buses on campus multiple times each day. CT also offers ZIP service for our community that get over to HWY 99 for specializde transportation

Cross-border challenges for TAP.

Non-drivers already lack the ways to effectively meet ASAP travel needs in the same way drivers do. Not being able to use fixed-route transit makes this worse.

Continuity of service across jurisdictions

The dream is on-demand service for paratransit users, but it's challenging for the providers.

Eligibility determination can be intimidating and can scare away clients who would otherwise qualify

Are there any other challenges getting around (such as walking, biking, riding a taxi)?

Bike friendly infrastructure is very limited.

bike routes/networks are frequently disconnected and indirect.

Bike lanes are too close to cars - there need to be physical barriers for biker safety. It is even more dangerous because drivers may be using their phone on the road.

Lack of safe routes, clear information including consistent signage and navigation information, connections to transit.

I'd like to see continuity in micromobility options across city/county lines.

Sidewalks and curb ramps are NOT compliant with ADA across the county. Transition plans pay lip service, but this is not a priority for repair work.

Cars are required to be built with an incredible number of passenger safety devices. Pedestrians are required to be protected by white paint. This doesn't seem equitable.
