Transit Operators Committee Meeting Summary

Welcome and Introductions

Peter Heffernan, King County Metro, welcomed everyone at 10:00 a.m. Peter took roll call and confirmed the members and alternates present.

Approval of Meeting Summary

The summary for the December 4, 2024, meeting was approved.

Action: TOC Vice-Chair for 2025

Gil Cerise, PSRC, shared that PSRC only received one nomination for Vice-Chair to complete the term initiated by Melinda Adams (Everett Transit). When Melinda left the agency, this left a vacancy in this key committee leadership position. Alex Krieg (Sound Transit) has agreed to take on the role of Vice-Chair through the remainder of the term, ending in December 2025.

Discussion/Action: Local Transit representation on the Regional TOD Committee

Gil Cerise, PSRC, shared information on the Regional TOD Committee request that TOC fill two membership seats for local transit on that committee. The seats are currently held by King County Metro and Pierce Transit. Gil clarified conditions of the three-year membership term, and shared that there are designated membership seats on RTOD Committee for Sound Transit, WSDOT, and City of Seattle. The committee agreed to provide nominations by email, following the meeting. The committee agreed with Gil's suggestion that a vote-by-email be completed prior to the February TOC meeting to select local transit members.

Discussion: Transit in the RTP (Frequency/Span)

Gil Cerise and Craig Helmann, PSRC, shared information that PSRC has been developing to illustrate quality of transit service to the board and in RTP documents. Craig shared options for how PSRC characterizes frequency of service and span of service to illustrate areas of the region that do/do not have access to frequent service and service that reaches people working and using transit outside of normal commute hours. Craig also shared density thresholds to identify needs for density of households and jobs (activity units) for various types of transit. These illustrations and data associated with them can tell a story about where there are gaps in transit service today, and then the agency will assess future conditions later in the RTP development process.

King County Metro Redistribution Request

Request: King County Metro (KCM) requests to redistribute \$1,864,761 in Seattle-Tacoma Everett Urbanized Area (STE UZA) FFY2023 5337 HIFG funds between the projects identified below.

Explanation: KCM requests to redistribute funds from MET-235 (Atlantic Base Trolley Power System Replacement) to new project MET-284 (SR 520 Portage Bay Bridge Trolley Infrastructure Replacement). The redistribution is needed because MET-235 has been significantly delayed and is on pause until approximately 2030. KCM has identified MET-284 as an eligible priority project that is in need of funding in order to move forward and to help maintain Metro trolley bus service on routes utilizing this infrastructure. The redistribution will allow KCM to maintain the schedule with WSDOT's related bridge replacement project.

PSRC Guidance to Transit Agencies on RTP Inputs

February 5, 2025 email to transit agencies who provide these RTP inputs to PSRC. Updates to the February 5, 2025 email to transit agencies are included in red font.

To TOC members and other transit stakeholders:

We are including all TOC members and alternates on this email, as well as any transit agency staff who participated in local transit outreach meetings with PSRC in December 2024.

As part of developing the next Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), PSRC is gathering longrange transit planning data and planning assumptions from the region's transit agencies, including:

- **Regional Capacity projects**, meeting thresholds established under federal and state rules (see: <u>https://www.psrc.org/media/7615</u>). The call for submissions is planned for the week of **March 24, 2025**. Transit agencies will be notified when the date is finalized. Contact is Jennifer Barnes, Program Manager: <u>jbarnes@psrc.org</u>.
- Future transit network data (in GTFS format) for both 2035 and 2050, to account for PSRC's planning horizon and an interim planning period. As in past collaborations on this work, attributes that PSRC seeks include service characteristics, route and stop locations for bus, rail, and ferry modes. Future transit network submissions are requested by April 1, 2025. Please send this data to Erin Hogan, Associate Planner, at ehogan@psrc.org.
- Financial strategy/Maintenance and Preservation data and assumptions to assist PSRC in developing reasonably expected costs for future transit operations, maintenance, and programmatic capital investments. PSRC sent a survey to transit agency staff on February 13, 2025. The deadline to submit survey responses is March 18, 2025. Please submit surveys or ask questions by contacting Gary Simonson, Senior Planner, at <u>gsimonson@psrc.org</u>.

We recognize that each transit agency develops their long-range plan with varying financial constraint parameters, resulting in variations in how each transit agency submits data to PSRC. For the next RTP, PSRC is providing guidance for how agencies should submit this data to PSRC to provide more regionally consistent long-range planning parameters.

- 1. We request that agencies provide data that is **based upon their latest long-range plans**, factoring in transit agency board and/or executive management direction on changed circumstances and updates since the long-range plan was last adopted.
- 2. If several scenarios were considered and adopted in the long-range plan, we request that the agency use only its preferred alternative or the alternative that most closely matches the agencies' current long-range planning direction. Project submissions and service data should be based on decisions adopted by transit agency boards or clearly articulated by agency leadership.

- 3. PSRC's RTP includes a financial strategy containing both current law revenues and an identification of new revenue sources determined to be feasible to achieve over the long-range planning horizon, the combination of which demonstrates full funding of the investments in the plan. With respect to **consistent financial assumptions** to be submitted, PSRC requests that agencies provide information on projects and services levels that could be funded through a combination of existing revenues and reasonably expected new revenues (whether that means additional taxation authority within existing law, or development of new revenue sources that could be considered to be in place by 2050, even if yet to be determined). Rather than submitting only those investments for which current funding is available, agencies should submit investments that the agency is **planning for and committed to** that may require additional sources. We further ask that information on the necessary additional funding be provided.
- 4. The RTP will also have space to address more aspirational project ideas, outside of the project list and financial strategy. We will no longer include the "unprogrammed" category on the Regional Capacity Projects list. The RTP will instead provide separate space for articulating those projects that need further planning before being included as a candidate project by the 2050 planning horizon. The distinction between "aspirational" projects and projects requiring additional funding sources comes down to the level of planning and commitment. Please confer with PSRC staff if there are questions in determining which investments may fall under which category.

PSRC staff plan to continue these discussions through the Transit Operators Committee (TOC) and other forums, as well as through individual meetings to obtain as consistent information as we can across transit agencies.

Highlights of the Transit System today


Transit is experiencing:

 - 75% of 2019 ridership
 - 90% of 2019 service provided
- People rely upon transit for a variety of needs, peak hour commuting is a smaller market today.

Trip Purposes for Transit Riders: Spring 2023



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Most transit riders walk or roll to transit


Access Mode for Transit Riders: Spring 2023








